I In the third year of the reign of King Jehoiakim of Judah, King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon came to Jerusalem and besieged it. **2** The Lord let King Jehoiakim of Judah fall into his power, as well as some of the vessels of the house of God. These he brought to the land of Shinar and placed the vessels in the treasury of his gods.

**3** Then the king commanded his palace master Ashpenaz to bring some of the Israelites of the royal family and of the nobility, **4** young men without physical defect and handsome, versed in every branch of wisdom, endowed with knowledge and insight, and competent to serve in the king's palace; they were to be taught the literature and language of the Chaldeans. **5** The king assigned them a daily portion of the royal rations of food and wine. They were to be educated for three years, so that at the end of that time they could be stationed in the king's court. **6** Among them were Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah, from the tribe of Judah. **7** The palace master gave them other names: Daniel he called Belteshazzar, Hananiah he called Shadrach, Mishael he called Meshach, and Azariah he called Abednego.

8 But Daniel resolved that he would not defile himself with the royal rations of food and wine; so he asked the palace master to allow him not to defile himself. **9** Now God allowed Daniel to receive favor and compassion from the palace master. 10 The palace master said to Daniel, "I am afraid of my lord the king; he has appointed your food and your drink. If he should see you in poorer condition than the other young men of your own age, you would endanger my head with the king." II Then Daniel asked the guard whom the palace master had appointed over Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah: 12 "Please test your servants for ten days. Let us be given vegetables to eat and water to drink. 13 You can then compare our appearance with the appearance of the young men who eat the royal rations, and deal with your servants according to what you observe." 14 So he agreed to this proposal and tested them for ten days. **I5** At the end of ten days it was observed that they appeared better and fatter than all the young men who had been eating the royal rations. 16 So the guard continued to withdraw their royal rations and the wine they were to drink, and gave them vegetables. 17 To these four young men God gave knowledge and skill in every aspect of literature and wisdom; Daniel also had insight into all visions and dreams.

18 At the end of the time that the king had set for them to be brought in, the palace master brought them into the presence of Nebuchadnezzar, 19 and the king spoke with them. And among them all, no one was found to compare with

Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah; therefore they were stationed in the king's court. **20** In every matter of wisdom and understanding concerning which the king inquired of them, he found them ten times better than all the magicians and enchanters in his whole kingdom. **21** And Daniel continued there until the first year of King Cyrus.

#### **Teacher's Preparation**

Jerusalem, the capital of the Southern Kingdom Judah was captured by the Babylonian king Nebuchadnezzar in 597 BCE during the reign of king Jehoiachin. Daniel is one of the Hebrew boys taken into exile in Babylon. King Nebuchadnezzar decided to train some young Hebrew boys from the royal lineage who were physically fit, handsome and wise to serve in the palace court. Of these boys, four of them; Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah stood out as God's chosen people because they remained faithful to the Jewish law while serving a foreign king. They chose to eat vegetables and drink water rather than defiling themselves with the rich and fattening food and wine that was served from the King's table. Even though the palace officials believed that they must eat the "choice food" in order to be physically strong and wise, the four young men proved them wrong and were found to be more superior in intelligence and wisdom than the young men who ate the palace food. God's favor was shown upon these four men because they remained steadfast in their faith. Although they had the opportunity to succumb to the worldly temptations of the palace, instead, they chose to live simply and humbly serving the God of Israel. The aim of the lesson is to make the students understand that if you remain steadfast in your faith, God will provide and watches over his chosen people at all times.

#### **Student Introduction**

Have you ever been in a situation where you feel like you need to give into the temptations of the world? Were you ever given opportunity to share your faith in God with others?

## **Bible Exploration**

The Babylonian King Nebuchadnezzar, commanded his palace master Ashpenaz to train some of the Hebrew boys to be specially trained in Babylon to serve in the King's court. Of the men chosen, four stood out for their courage and willingness to profess their faith in the midst of adversity. The men were given new names by the chief official. To Daniel, the name Belteshazzar; to Hananiah the name Shadrach; to Mishael the name Meshach and to Azariah the name Abednego. As a part

of the King's order, they were offered food and wine from the King's table. However, Daniel did not want to defile himself by indulging in the royal food and wine, so he asked the chief official for permission to not eat the palace food. Although refusing to follow the king's order meant death, they decided to remain steadfast in their faith and religious practices rather than polluting their bodies with food that was not prepared according to the lewish law. In Leviticus Ch: I I, we read that the Israelites were not allowed to eat the meat of certain "un-clean" animals. Also, in Leviticus 17:12, we can see that the Israelites were forbidden to eat meat that was not slaughtered according to the Jewish laws.

The chief official feared that if he granted Daniel's wish, the King would become angry and kill the chief official for not taking proper care of the four men. Daniel then asked for a test for ten days. He asked that they be given nothing to eat and drink but vegetables and water. The test would compare the appearance of Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah with the other young men who were eating the royal food. At the end of the ten days, the four men looked healthier and superior in appearance than the men who ate the food given by the palace. God blessed the men by giving them knowledge and understanding and Daniel could understand dreams and visions. The time had come for the chief official to present the men to King Nebuchadnezzar and "the king talked with them, and he found none equal to Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah" and they were stationed in the King's court. They were found to be 10 times better in wisdom and intelligence than all the enchanters and magicians in the whole kingdom.
